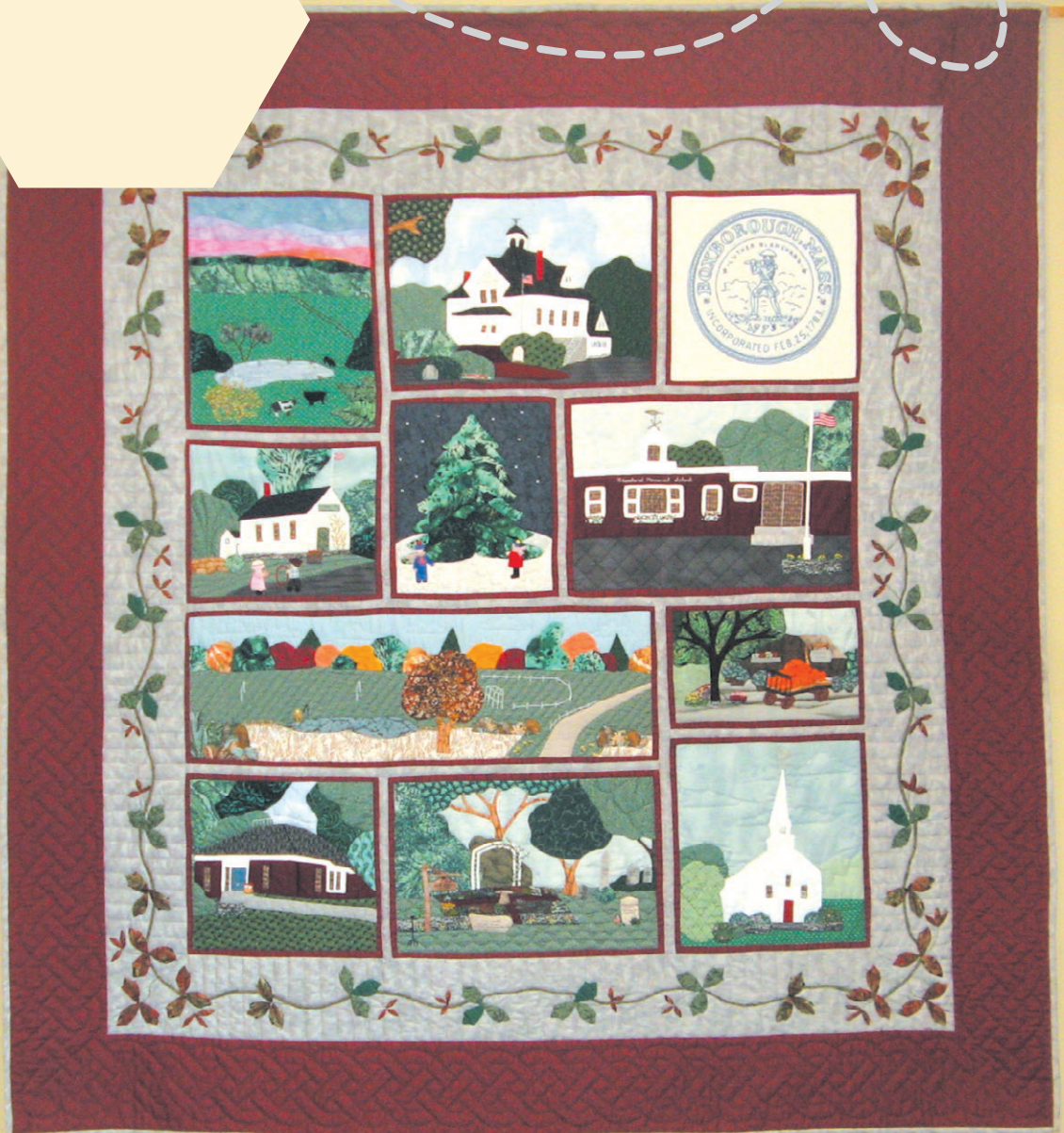

Select Board's Corner

This time of year, it's all about Town Meeting. Boards, Committees, Commissions, the Town Administrator and Department Heads develop budgets and warrant articles for the upcoming fiscal year. Both the Finance Committee and Select Board undertake a rigorous process to vet the submitted budgets and warrant articles before voting and finalizing for submission to Town Meeting.

TOWN MEETING

Town Meeting is the process by which Boxborough registered voters approve budgets, vote on capital purchases, approve bylaws and determine land use. Voters get to say what we value as a community and what we are willing to pay for.

THE WARRANT

The warrant is a document sent to all households of registered voters setting forth the date, time, place and business of Town Meeting. The Select Board owns the warrant. The warrant includes the budget, as proposed by the Finance Committee, the proposed changes in the compensation and classification plan, and warrant articles.

TOWN OPERATING BUDGET

The Finance Committee is responsible for the Town's operating budget. They own it. What you see in the warrant is what was voted by the Finance Committee. They will present and explain the budget at Annual Town Meeting. Generally speaking, the Select Board may endorse the budget in its entirety or make recommendations to amend some portion of the budget.

FINANCIAL WARRANT ARTICLES

Warrant Articles are normally one-time items not considered a part of the operating budget. They include both capital and non-capital items. Capital items include things like the replacement of an ambulance, the purchase of an additional voting machine, or a fire suppression system for the Police Department. Non-capital items include things like funding our cable TV operations or changes in the classification and compensation plan. To further ensure transparency, Boxborough has a long-standing tradition and practice of putting all additions to staff (head count) in a warrant article.

The Select Board votes on most warrant articles, while the Finance Committee votes on all warrant articles. Generally speaking the Select Board does not vote on warrant articles sponsored by other elected Boards, although there are always exceptions to this practice.

NON-FINANCIAL WARRANT ARTICLES

There are always non-financial warrant articles for consideration.

This year, the Planning Board has submitted 15 warrant articles for Town Meeting. There is a bylaw change for a new Flexible Overlay District and several bylaw changes for marijuana zoning. Changes in the zoning bylaws require a two-thirds vote of registered voters in attendance.



SELECT BOARD RECOMMENDATION ON FLEXIBLE OVERLAY DISTRICT

The Select Board recommends and fully endorses the zoning bylaw changes for the Flexible Overlay District proposed by the Planning Board. These zoning bylaw changes are strategically aligned with the Master Plan 2030.

The Select Board, Planning Board and Town Planner, in coordination with the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC), conducted an extensive process of public forums, surveys and community outreach starting in December 2014 and culminating with approval of the plan by both the Select Board and Planning Board three years ago, in January 2016. The top priorities in the Master Plan include: economic development, transportation and infrastructure mobility, water resource management, energy conservation, and meeting the needs of the community (social services, moderately priced housing, and open space/recreational facilities for all ages). The Select Board and Planning Board continue to work together to implement the plan.

The zoning bylaw changes, advances several key priorities for the Town. Economic development improves the quality of life for residents with a village like area with restaurants, pubs, shops, and other amenities (Master Plan 2030 Strategy 3.1.3 page 15). Land to be gifted to the Town will provide a new location for the Fire Station (Master Plan 2030 Goal 4.2 page 20). Commercial development (Master Plan 2030 Goals 3.2 and 3.3 pages 16 and 18) provides a sustainable tax rate to Town residents.

A sustainable tax rate is not a lower tax rate, it's a rate that provides our community with services at a reasonable cost. With a declining commercial tax base in Boxborough, taxes are shifted from commercial to residential home owners. This zoning bylaw change allows for a modest increase in commercial development to help maintain a reasonable tax rate.

There will be several public forums and other opportunities to learn more about the zoning bylaw changes prior to Town Meeting.

To ensure that the Town's interests are protected, the Select Board and Town Administrator are working on a negotiated "Development Agreement" with Lincoln Properties. The agreement will be tailored to the Town's specifications and requirements.

Running for

Boxborough depends on volunteers to keep the town running. Participating in town government can be a challenging and rewarding experience. While many boards are appointed, there are five elected boards: Select Board, Planning Board, Board of Health, Library Trustees, and School Committee. In order to serve on these boards, you must run for office, which is not as daunting as it sounds.

The first step may be to attend meetings of the board you are interested in joining. Meeting dates and agendas are published on the town website (www.boxborough-ma.gov) and are open to the public. Attending a few meetings will enable you to see the kinds of issues that come before the board and help you determine whether there's a fit with your interests and skills.

The annual town election is held in May on the second Tuesday following the start of Annual Town Meeting.

THIS YEAR THE ELECTION IS MAY 21

Each year, at least one seat on each board is on the ballot.

This year the following seats will appear on the ballot:

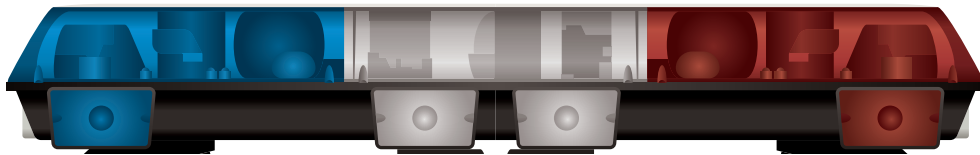

Candidates qualify to have their names appear on the ballot by taking out Nomination Papers from the Town Clerk, obtaining at least 26 signatures from registered Boxborough voters, and returning them to the Town Clerk for certification. Nomination Papers are made available starting in mid-January. This years' filing deadline is April 2. If you think you might be interested in running, there is still time!

In addition to Board and Committee seats, the positions of Town Clerk, Moderator, and Constable are also elected and will appear on the ballot. There will also be questions on a general bylaw to ban marijuana and zoning bylaws to regulate marijuana.



BOXBOROUGH POLICE DEPARTMENT

This month, your Boxborough Police Department is sharing information and tips about scams and frauds, especially towards senior citizens. We receive several calls weekly reporting some type of fraud or con and want to help citizens stay aware and protected.



Why are seniors targeted?

- They may have a “nest egg” or excellent credit.
- Growing up in the 1930s-1950’s can make seniors more trustful and easily exploited
- Older Americans are less likely to report a fraud due to shame, confusion, or lack of awareness
- Con artists know the effect of age on memory which may make an elderly victim a poor witness or easily confused.
- Seniors are more interested in certain types of products to improve quality of life, i.e. cognitive and physical function, illness and cancer cures

What are some common scams aimed at senior citizens?

- Microsoft Support Scams: Victims may be called or emailed by what seems to be a legitimate phone number or email web link and told they need to open a program to “fix” a problem that doesn’t exist. The scammer then can take over the computer, and demand money to restore “problem”.
- Medicare Scams: A fraudulent “worker” may call or visit and ask for personal information. In truth, Medicare will never call email or visit and ask for personal information.
- Counterfeit Drug scams: Be aware of illegitimate firms offering very low prices.
- Funeral and Cemetery scams: Potential scammers may attend the funeral of a stranger and take advantage by claiming to know the deceased and ask for money from a debt.
- Anti-aging products- Scammers may offer products with no scientific or medical value, that may be harmful.
- Telemarketing scams: The most popular form of scam because older Americans make more purchases over the phone than younger age groups.
- Fake accident/illness/Grandparent scams: Scammers pretend to be a so-called relative who needs help usually in some far-off place. Often, they request to be paid via Western Union or Moneygram.
- Pigeon Drop: Scammers claim to have found a large sum of money and will split with the victim.

Other popular scams involve fake charities, internet fraud, email “phishing” scams, investment schemes, reverse mortgage frauds and lottery wins.

PREPARING FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

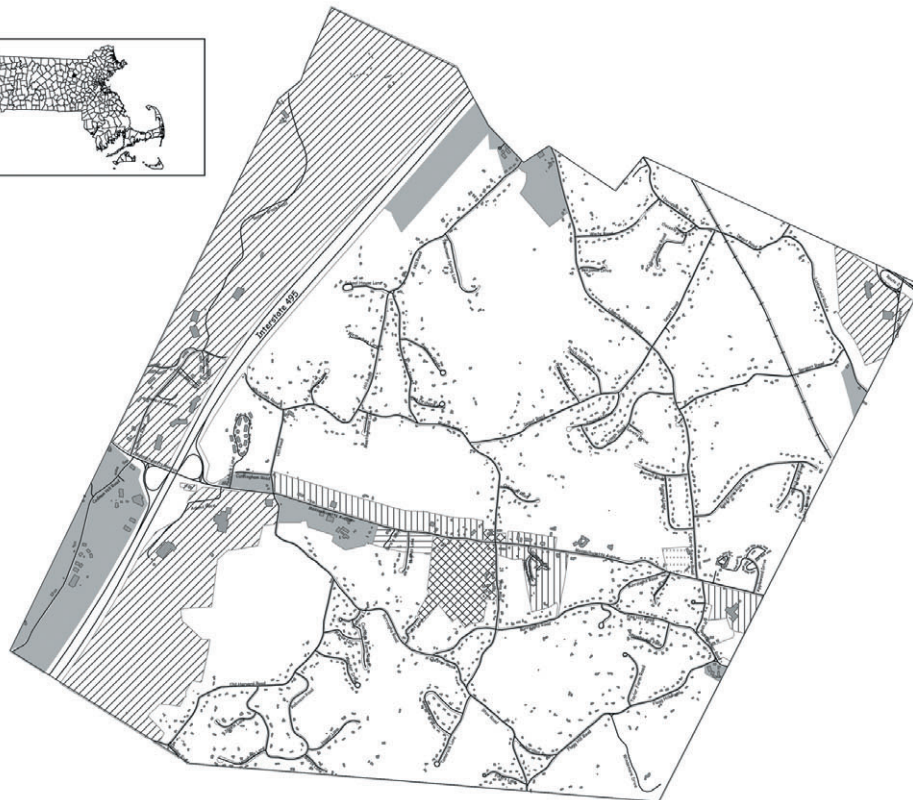
WHAT IS ZONING AND WHY DO WE NEED IT?

Zoning bylaws have a powerful impact on quality of life. They help cities and towns control the physical development of land and the kinds of uses that are allowed on each individual property.

Boxborough has seven districts or zones that define what's allowed. See the zoning map below for each. This map can be found in the Zoning Bylaw on Town's website.

Within each district, there are established permitted uses, prohibited uses, and uses that may be permitted by a special permit granting authority (either the Planning Board or Zoning Board of Appeals).

For example:

2110 Automobile Service Station shall mean any establishment where gasoline and other petroleum products are sold and may include accessory facilities for the sale of other retail products, but excluding any motor vehicle maintenance activities such as vehicle repair, or auto detailing.

In this example, a business owner could not build a gas station anywhere in the Agricultural-Residential District, but could apply to the Planning Board for a special permit to build in the Office Park or Industrial Commercial Districts. Our zoning bylaw defines each use and details the uses that are permitted in each district.

Per Mass General Law, any changes to a town’s bylaw requires a two-thirds majority vote by Town Meeting.

So, now that you have an overview of zoning, keep reading to learn about the Planning Board’s proposed changes to Boxborough’s Zoning Bylaw.

The Planning Board is proposing new zoning bylaws at Town Meeting and has gathered input from public hearings, meetings, forums, and outside professionals to formulate these bylaws.

WHAT ARE THE PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE ZONING BYLAW?

CREATING A FLEXIBLE OVERLAY DISTRICT

What is an overlay zoning district?

An overlay zone is a zoning district which is applied over one or more established zoning districts and establishes use regulations for the covered properties while the underlying regulations of the existing zoning remain in place. Overlay zoning is often used to promote specific types of development to meet a communities’ needs.

Where is the proposed overlay district?

This overlay will cover some parcels in our Office Park zone that are near I-495 on Route 111 and on Swanson Road, as well as two properties on Codman Hill Road that are in the Industrial Commercial zone.

Why are we proposing an overlay district?

The Planning Board is proposing an overlay district to allow for additional uses in what has otherwise been undeveloped and/or underutilized property along Interstate 495.

The Planning Board’s proposal was driven by the Economic Development Committee which was re-established to help achieve the goals of Boxborough’s Master Plan 2030.

Boxborough 2030 was prepared with the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC) and provides a long term vision for the town. It was developed “through public outreach and community sensing” and the top priority that came out of the plan was to

“Encourage **economic development** which will improve the **quality of life** for residents, such as supporting development of a **village-like area** with restaurants, pubs, shops, fitness and health services, and other amenities. Economic development should not be pursued simply to increase the commercial tax base.”

The current zoning for Office Park and Industrial Commercial zones do not allow for many of the uses that our Master Plan set forth as goals. If we update the use tables and dimensional requirements, we can realize the village and amenities that we so desire.

The Master Plan’s goals with respect to future land use development areas specified the land along the I-495 corridor. Our proposed overlay district targets these parcels.

How will the overlay zone district differ from the underlying Office Park or Industrial Commercial zone?

To create a business-friendly overlay zone, we have added and updated some of the use definitions and expanded what is allowed in this district. For example, current zoning in the underlying districts for service shops, restaurants/bars, retail stores, or craft shops/art studios requires a special permit. In the proposed overlay district, the uses would be allowed “as of right.”

Applicants would go through the site plan approval process which provides for an adequate review of development plans which may impact traffic, drainage, town services, environmental quality, and community character.

We have also proposed some changes to the dimensional schedule, allowing more coverage of land so as to accommodate some of the expanded uses such as warehouses. Please visit the Planning Board's website which contains a complete text of the proposed bylaw.

BUT, WAIT, THERE'S MORE!

A ZONING BYLAW REGULATING RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA

Like it or not, legalization of recreational marijuana (RM) was approved by Massachusetts voters in November 2016. Boxborough was among the many cities and towns in the Commonwealth that voted in favor. Cities and towns are now responsible for the regulation of recreational marijuana establishments (RME's) within their borders, and Boxborough needs to address this issue through zoning.

Recreational marijuana establishments (RME's) include more than just retail "pot shops." RME's, per Massachusetts law, include the following businesses: marijuana cultivator, marijuana testing facility, marijuana research facility, marijuana product manufacturer, marijuana retailer, or any other type of licensed marijuana-related business which is not a Registered Marijuana Dispensary.

Currently, Boxborough has a temporary moratorium on RME's that will expire on June 30, 2019. The outcome of the proposed zoning bylaws voted at Town Meeting will determine WHICH, if any, types of RMEs are allowed and WHERE they may locate.

This begs the question: Why is the Planning Board putting forth a complicated RM bylaw when we already had a Special Town Meeting in September 2018 that passed a ban?

The bylaw that STM passed in September 2018 is a general bylaw, not a zoning bylaw, and it does not regulate land use pertaining to RMEs.

Massachusetts Attorney General recommends that towns adopt a zoning bylaw to affect a ban.

A general bylaw is more apt to be legally challenged primarily because the threshold to pass (simple majority) is much lower, and it can be argued that a town favored a general bylaw to ease the passage of the bylaw.

- ***The Planning Board is not advocating for the allowance or prohibition of RMEs. Rather, we are presenting a zoning bylaw that gives Boxborough voters a better way to either regulate or prohibit (ban) RME's.***
- ***A zoning bylaw will ensure that IF any RMEs are allowed in Boxborough, they will be properly located and regulated.***
- ***IF RME's are not allowed, the ban under a zoning bylaw will be much stronger compared to the ban under a general bylaw.***

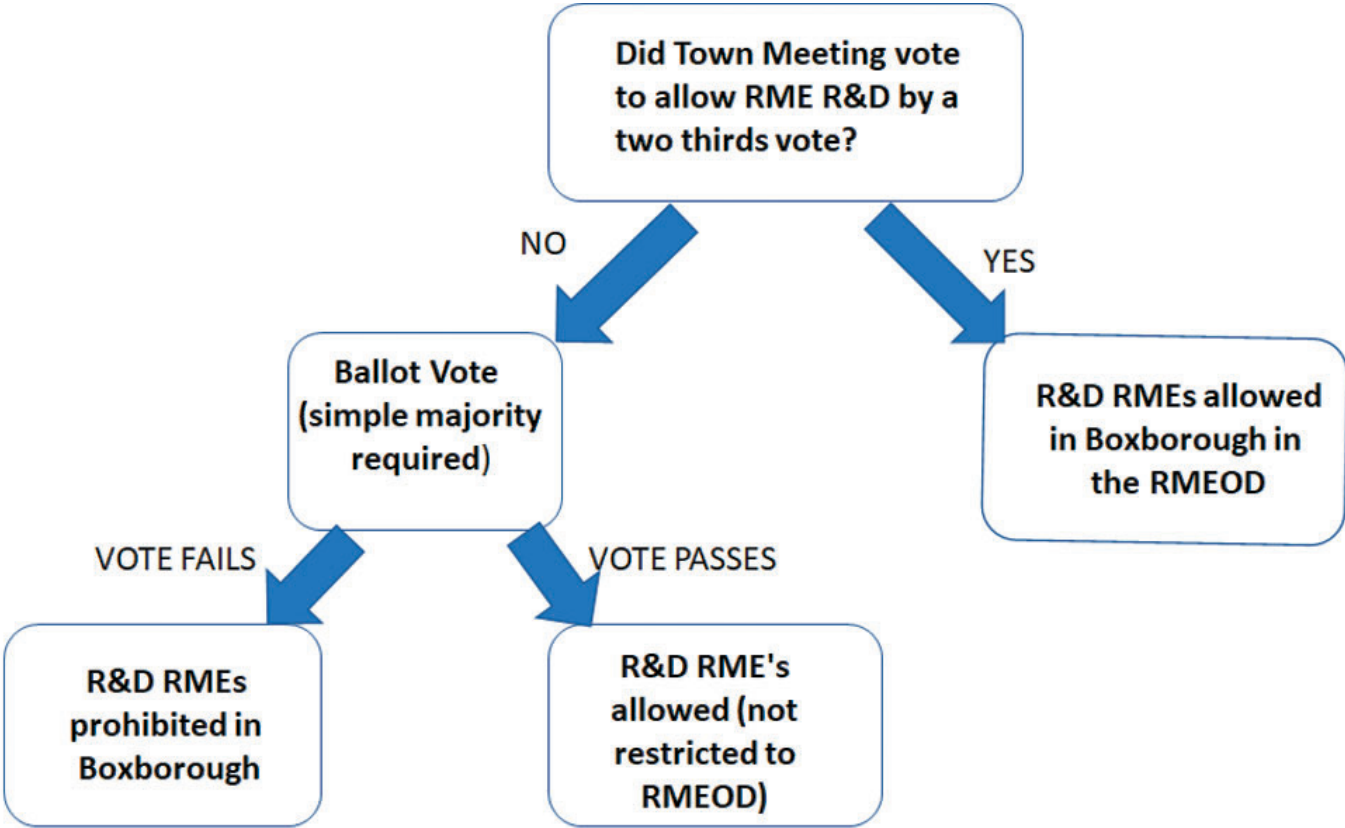
The proposed bylaw separates each type of RME and asks voters to decide whether or not to allow any RMEs in Boxborough. The outcome will determine WHICH, if any, types of RMEs are allowed and WHERE they may locate.

Any vote by Town Meeting to ban any of the RMEs must go to a "vote of the voters." In other words, a vote to ban at Town Meeting must be reinforced by a ballot vote with the same results (ban). The reason for needing two votes (to

ban) is due to the results of the November 2016 election in which a majority of Boxborough voters favored legalizing recreational marijuana. The Attorney General has determined that towns favorable to legalization must take this two step process to “overturn” the will of the voters.

Take a look at the flow chart for the example article to understand how the scenarios of Town Meeting votes can unfold:

Again, two votes are required for a prohibition (Town Meeting and ballot); one vote (Town Meeting) is required for approval. For the purposes of this article, I have simplified the bylaw, outcomes, and implications. Do your homework to make an informed choice!

They aim to prevent disease and protect the health of our communities by providing immunization clinics, regular communicable disease investigation and follow-up, and by responding to disease outbreaks.

They invite you to attend the well adult clinics where you may have your blood pressure or blood sugar checked, or just talk about your concerns and receive individualized attention and care. Notes from THE BOARD OF HEALTH

Mosquitoes are clearly annoying pests. They swarm, buzz, and generate itchy bites. They also spread viruses that cause diseases such as West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis. When health surveillance demonstrates the local presence of these viruses, spraying adult mosquitoes with insecticide is indicated for public health and safety.

Use of insecticides presents environmental concerns making it preferable to find other methods for disease prevention.

Boxborough is a member of the Central Massachusetts Mosquito Control Project (CMMCP). Utilizing maintenance, monitoring and larvae control, this successful mosquito prevention program controls the mosquito population in Boxborough largely without spraying insecticides.

There is no treatment for Eastern Equine Encephalitis. In Massachusetts, about half of the people identified with EEE died from the infection. People who survive this disease will often be permanently disabled. Few people recover completely.

West Nile Virus causes few symptoms in most people, however, persons older than 50 years of age have a higher risk of developing severe illness. Up to 1% of people infected with WNV will develop severe illness, including encephalitis or meningitis.

CENTRAL MASS. MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT



How does CMMCP control mosquitoes without spraying to kill them?

LARVAL MOSQUITO MONITORING Wetlands and suspected mosquito larval sites are monitored from March through September to determine the need for larval mosquito control. By controlling mosquitoes in their larval stage the need for adult mosquito spraying is greatly reduced.

DITCH MAINTENANCE Mosquitoes need still, stagnant water to complete their metamorphosis from egg to adult. The CMMCP conducts maintenance on ditches, culverts and man-made ponds to improve water quality, increase water flow, restore historic flow patterns and reduce the potential for larval mosquito habitat.

MOSQUITO SURVEILLANCE Mosquito populations are monitored in both the larval and adult stages to determine the appropriate control methods to be employed, record prevalent mosquito species, and determine disease transmission potential. The surveillance program routinely sends samples to be tested for mosquito-borne viruses.

LARVAL MOSQUITO CONTROL The material of choice for larvicide is called Bti (*Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis*). It is a bacteria that doesn't reproduce. When the mosquito larvae eat the Bti it is fatal to the mosquito but has little impact on other aquatic life. In Boxborough a granular type of Bti is delivered by helicopter, usually mid-April, to hard to reach wetlands determined to be primary mosquito breeding areas.

Another product used by CMMCP is called methoprene. Methoprene is an insect growth regulator specific to mosquito larvae. The presence of methoprene in the water prevents mosquito larvae from hatching, but doesn't harm anything else. CMMCP uses methoprene in catch basins only. Storm drains throughout town are monitored to see if they are holding water, and if so, methoprene is added to reduce the potential of mosquito from these areas.

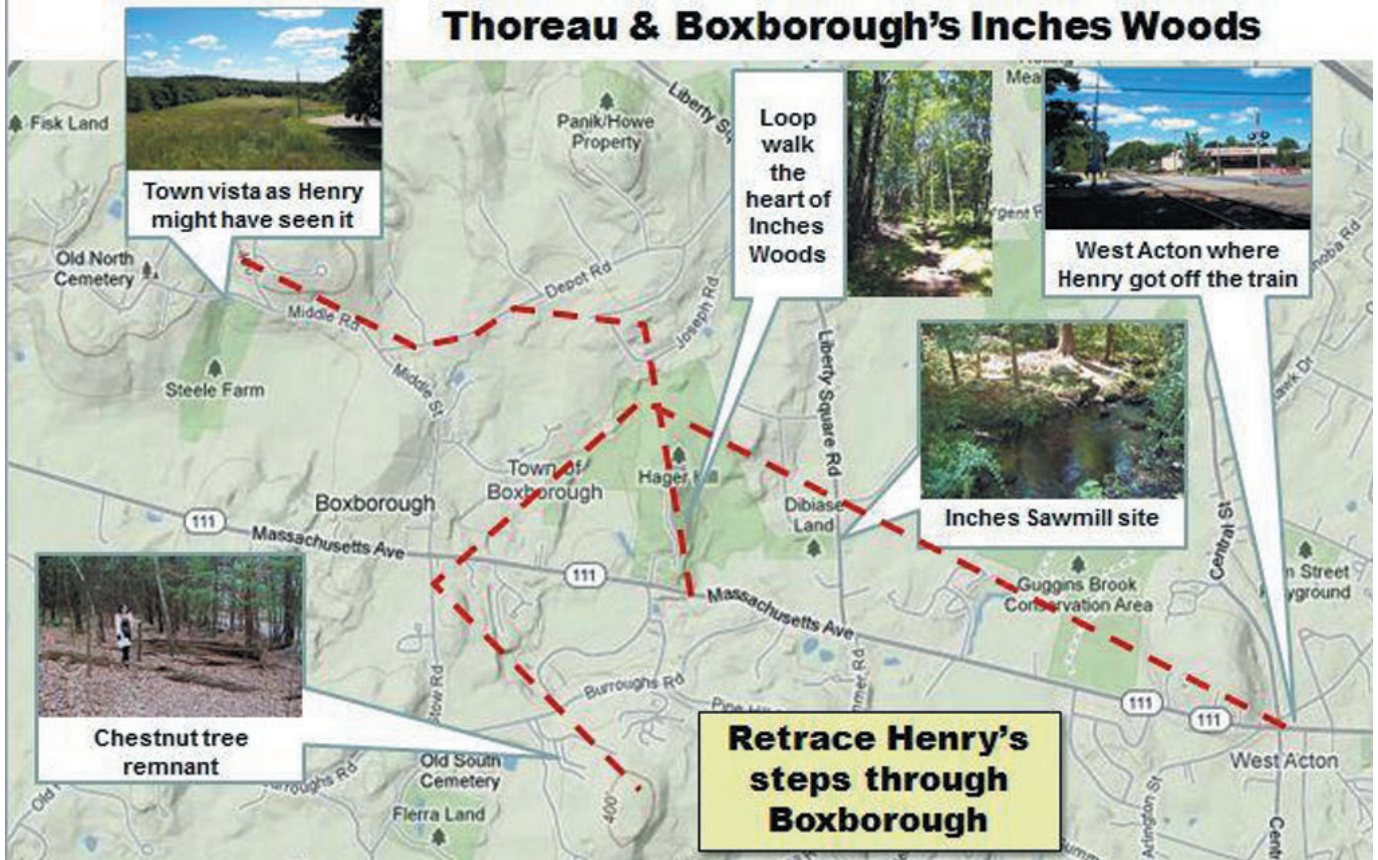

This issue we're showcasing some of the amazing projects that have happened at Blanchard and RJ Grey. Enjoy reading these inspiring stories not only conducted by our students, but written up by them as well.



RISE AGAINST HUNGER

Meghan Lawson is a 13 year old Boxborough resident and RJ Grey eighth grader who spent this past winter planning and executing an extraordinary event to help in the fight against world hunger. Here is Meghan's story:

On January 12th, 122 members of the Acton-Boxborough community came together to package 15,768 meals with the organization Rise Against Hunger. This project all started in my 6th-grade year at Blanchard Memorial School. Every year, the 6th-grade does a Stand-Up For Project, where the 6th-graders chose to advocate for

something they are passionate about. For my project, I decided that I would stand up for world hunger. After the project was over and the year was ending, I felt inclined to take it one step further, and actually do something about it. A few years earlier, I had participated in a different Rise Against Hunger packing event at Boston College with my family. I saw children as young as four making a difference in world hunger and I thought we could do this in my community. I am so thankful the employees at Rise Against Hunger took a thirteen-year-old seriously and took the time to meet and discuss with me the requirements to host a packing event.

On the day of the event, after unloading and setting up, people finally began to arrive to begin packaging meals. When everyone first began to arrive, our venue assistant first began by informing us about the event and how it would work. For the packaging, there were 3 different types of stations to work. The first was the meals themselves. People would scoop 1 cup of rice, 1 cup of soy, a tablespoon of dried vegetables, and a packet of vitamins into a plastic bag. This small bag would be able to produce 6 full meals by adding water. Then, the bags were taken to the measuring and sealing station, where rice was either added or taken away from the bag in order to be between 385 or 391g. The bags were then sealed and taken over to the final station. The bags were taken to a large grid where they were labeled and packed into boxes. Each time we reached 1,000 meals (about 5 boxes), someone randomly would be called up to ring a gong, to let everyone know we were one step closer to reaching our goal.

I feel like as the event continued, it really began to sink in for everyone what we were doing and how we were making a change. In the end, after about 2 ½ hours, we finally reached 15,000 meals, and I felt a sense of accomplishment throughout the room. Everyone had worked so hard to reach our goal and we all left knowing that we had made a difference in fighting the battle against world hunger.

Thank you to everyone who donated their money, time, and support. I would like to thank Mr. Shen and Mrs. Frey at the RJ and finally, thank you so much to Wedgewood Pines for their incredible generosity for donating their venue for the event. Everyone put in so much effort in order to make this event possible and I am incredibly grateful.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS



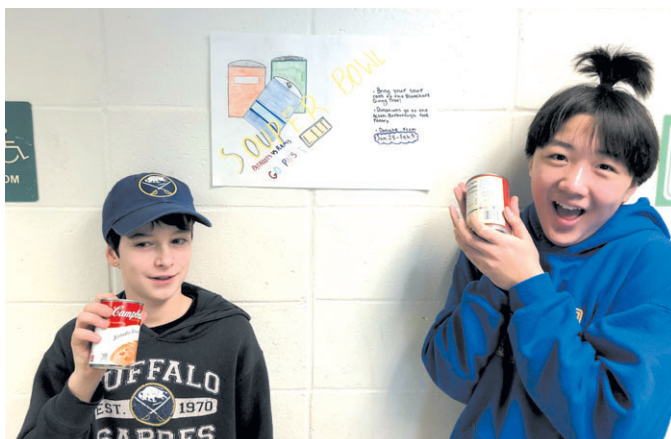
6th graders helping pack candy in to bags for veterans.

Ever heard of the Super Bowl? Of course you have because our beloved New England Patriots competed in it this year and won! Blanchard did a spin off of the Super Bowl and called it the “Souper” Bowl. The “Souper” Bowl was a non-perishable food drive. The Acton-Boxborough Food Pantry was running low on supplies after the holiday season, so we gave them a little boost. A special shout out to Mrs. Chavez for helping load and deliver the food. Thanks to everyone at Blanchard, we collected more than 350 items to deliver to the food pantry!
